# **EAAFP Ulsan Corporate Champion Programme: Travelers with wings in Ulsan For external promotion**

Ulsan Taehwa River was recognised in 2021 as an internationally important site for migratory waterbirds and was registered as a "Flyway Network Site (EAAF 150)" by the East Asian-Australasian Flyway Partnership (EAAFP). This designation highlights that Ulsan is a vital location not only in the Republic of Korea but also along the extensive migratory route stretching from Alaska, Russia, and Asia to Australia and New Zealand.

Migratory waterbirds travel thousands of kilometres each year. They sometimes stopover in Ulsan, RoK, and pass through countries such as Russia, China, and Australia. Their journey is not a single route but a connected 'network.' Therefore, protecting migratory waterbirds and their habitats in Ulsan also means safeguarding the birds that will arrive from or continue to distant countries.

From 2022 to 2024, through the EAAFP Corporate Champions Programme in Ulsan, citizens, Kyungdong City Gas, Korea Petrochemical, S-Oil, Hyundai Motor Company, the Ulsan City government, and volunteers have engaged in various activities to protect migratory waterbirds and nature. Many citizens have come to appreciate the importance of bird conservation through ecological education, birdwatching activities, and habitat clean-ups, demonstrating a strong willingness to participate.

Today, Ulsan is evolving from merely a resting place for migratory birds to a hub of collaboration for global migratory bird conservation.

In 2025, aligned with the World Migratory Bird Day theme, "Shared Spaces: Creating Bird-Friendly Cities and Communities," Ulsan's programmes will be delivered with greater diversity and depth.

By collaborating with local environmental organisations, opportunities for active citizen participation will grow, and Ulsan's experience will be showcased to the global community as a leading example of migratory bird conservation.
